

AUGUST CLUB TRIP - BLUE ROCK DAM



This month's club trip is a day outing on Sunday August 28th to Blue Rock Dam outside Moe. The lake is approx. 30 km north of Moe. To get there travel via M1 and turn left at Trafalgar on the Willow Grove Rd. Travelling time is 1.5 hours from Frankston. Further advice at this month's meeting.

There are ample opportunities for shore based fishing as well as "float tubes" and kayaks.

Originally built to supply drinking water to the surrounding Latrobe Valley, Blue Rock Lake is now home to a diverse range of freshwater fish species, from trout and redfin to carp and (more recently) Aussie bass. Since 2002, the lake has seen stocked with over 160,000 native Australian bass fingerlings which have become the prime target for anglers fishing the lake.



Blue Rock Lake has two main access points, one being the boat ramp at the dam wall off Spillway Rd which gives visitors access to about 700m of shoreline. The boat ramp is perfect for launching kayaks. When the lake is 100%, launching a boat here can be difficult due to the rocks lining the shoreline, but when the lake has dropped (like now), it's ideal for launching boats too.

The other main access point is at the northern end of the lake where there is another boat ramp off Old Tanjil Rd. This boat ramp is ideal for those looking to access the Tanjil Arm across the other side of the lake. This boat ramp gives land-based anglers access to about 800m of immediate shoreline. A walking track connects the northern boat ramp to Blue Rock Rd, just below Willow Grove, allowing 1.5km of further access to the shoreline.

Blue Rock really is a beautiful lake with a stunning backdrop of Mt Baw Baw and surrounding bushland. Freshwater anglers come from afar to target Australian bass, trout, redfin, eel and carp. The lake is suitable for boat, kayak, and land-based fishing.

Both boat ramps have terrific amenities with rotunda for shelter from sun and rain, BBQ's, a toilet block, picnic tables and huge well-maintained lawn areas for picnics.

FROM THE FLY TIERS DESK - EMERGER



Fix the hook in the vise. Run the tying thread on at the eye and wind it down the shank in close turns to a point opposite the barb. Take a pinch of gray cul-de-canard fibers and catch it in as the tail.



2 Tease out a pinch of olive Antron dubbing fur and apply it thinly to the tying thread. Twist it into a slim rope and wind it two-thirds of the way to the eye.



3 Choose two cul-de-canard plumes of equal size and of the same shade of gray. Put them together so that their tips are level and secure just in front of the body with a few turns of thread.



4 Take a second pinch of olive Antron and apply it to the tying thread. Wind the fur up to the eye to form a distinct thorax.



5 With the tying thread just behind the eye, take a needle and loop the cul-de-canard plumes around it. Keeping tension on the loop, secure the butts with thread at the eye.



6 With the looped back formed, remove the excess plumes with scissors. Finally, build a small, neat head with the thread before casting off with a whip finish.

SHOT OF THE MONTH from OUR TASSIE CORRESPONDENT

Tassie trout season opened here last week with the sun shining, lots of boats on the water and bank walkers all prospecting the many lakes both in the lowlands and highlands.

In the highlands many anglers in the Western Lakes had to compete with iced over waters but quite a few fish were caught pulling wets with DI 3 sink and sweep lines on Penstock.

On the low lands both Lake Leak and Four Springs had its fair share of boats on the water, I decided to miss the Saturday opening and start my season on Sunday at Four Springs.

With the large amount of rain over the last few months causing major flooding, Four Springs water was very dirty, however this didn't deter the fish from accepting a well presented Wooly Bugger or similar wet streamer and we caught 5 good fish including one nice brown and 2 good sized rainbows.

Joe Riley, Captain of the Australian Fly Fishing Team who is heading off to Canada in a few weeks for the world titles, caught 14 good fish at Penstock on Sunday. Regards Dave.
