NOVEMBER CLUB TRIP - MERRIJIG

Our November club trip is a return to the Victoria Police Alpine Club at Merrijig (283 Buttercup Road).

Take the Mount Buller Road from Mansfield for 13 kilometres. Turn left into Buttercup Road. After 2.8 kilometres look for the blue reflectors on the post on the left. Turn left and drive up the hill.

Fishing is in the adjacent Delatite and Howqua rivers with other options further afield if people are interested.

There is still room for extras but you will need to confirm (and pay!) this meeting.







FROM THE FLY TIERS DESK - BLOODWORM



1 Fix the hook in the vise and run the tying thread down the shank, stopping a short distance around the bend. Take a pinch of dyed red marabou and catch it in place at this point.



2 Wind close turns of thread over the waste ends of the marabou. This will form an even base for the body and ensure a smooth finish.



3 Once the eye has been reached, take 4 inches (10cm) of red Nymph Glass and catch it in with three tight thread wraps.



4 Stretch the Nymph Glass and secure it along the length of the shank with closely wound turns of tying thread.



5 When the tail is reached, take the thread back to the eye. Wind the Nymph Glass around the shank to the eye in tight, closely butted turns. Keep a steady tension at all times.



Secure the loose end with tying thread and remove the excess Nymph Glass. Build a neat head and cast off the tying thread.
