MARCH CLUB TRIP—NOOJEE AREA

Following on from last months newsletter article highlighting the fishing opportunities in the six rivers around Noojee—this month's Club Trip (next weekend March 21st/22nd) is set down for this area.

Club members intending to make it a weekend away and camp are setting up at the free camp area at:

Toorongo Falls Campground

Last Updated Oct 2014



Situated at the head of an attractive, narrow valley are three grassed clearings by the bubbling Toorongo River and surrounded by lush wet sclerophyll forest.



The first, by the entry gate, is a small, grassed flat with little shade and no facilities.

The second is a large grassed hillside with few level or shaded sites.

The third, accessed by a road below the toilet block, is a creek flat enclosed by steep slopes with some level, shaded riverside sites and a second toilet.

All sites are exposed to day trippers and show signs of popularity - they are a little scruffy.

Rated 3.5/5

Shade is provided by steep mountains, mature Mountain Ash and scattered Blackwood wattles. Kookaburras and rosellas are common.

The access road continues on a few hundred metres around the hill side to end at the day park, with an information board and tracks to the tumbling falls.

Number of sites: 20

Camping Fees: Free Camping

Toilets: Long drop or composting

Non-potable water may be available. Boil all water for at least 10 minutes before drinking.

Wood barbeques are available. Bring firewood and check fire bans.

There are fishing spots at or near this campsite.

Access

This site is accessible by caravans in good weather.

Getting there

From Melbourne, head east along the Princes Freeway turning left at the Drouin exit towards Noojee. From Noojee east 4k on the Mount Baw Baw Tourist Rd [C426], left (north) 5.2k up the Toorongo Falls Rd (1.5k sealed) to its end.

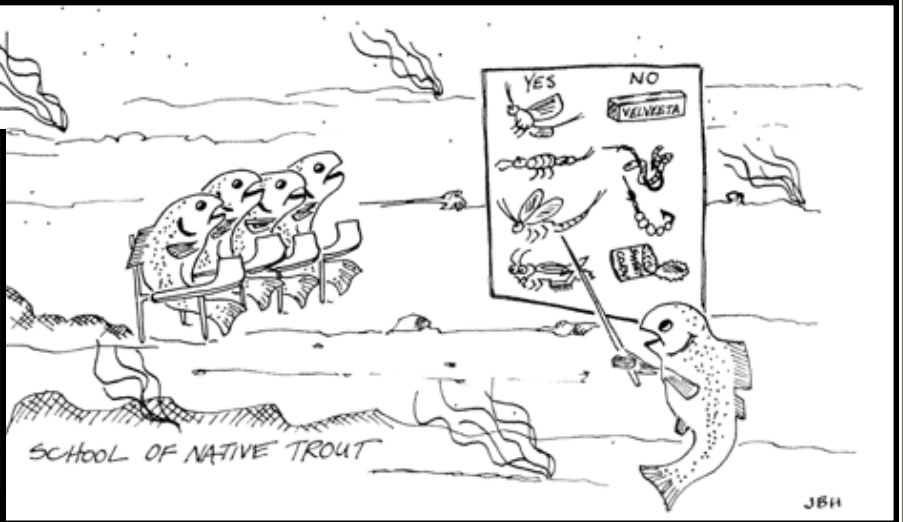
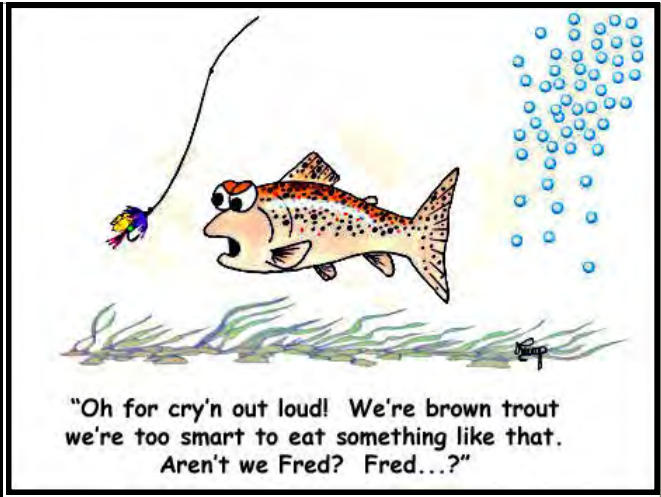

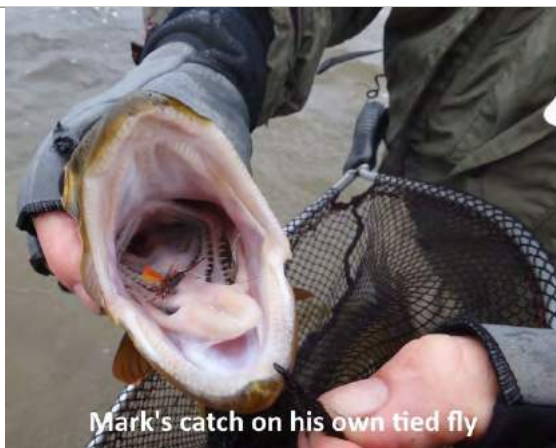
APRIL CLUB TRIP - TYERS RIVER

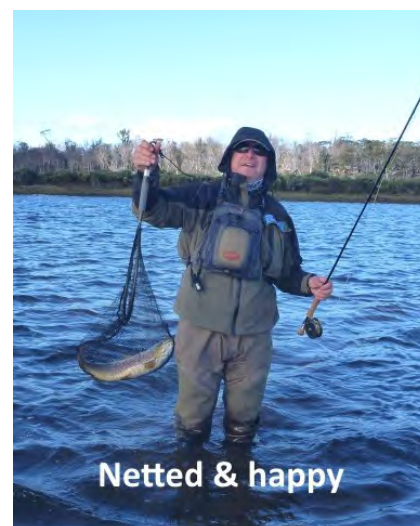


He's on!

2015 - the year the snow fell

FROM THE FLY TIERS DESK—ADAMS



1 With the hook fixed in the vise, run the tying thread a short distance down the shank. Select two grizzle hackle points and remove the base fibers so the tips are the same length as the hook.



2 Place the hackles together so that the tips are level. Catch the hackle in place by the bare sections of stem, a short distance from the eye.



3 Part the hackle points, using the tip of a needle if necessary. Pull the bare stems through the gap and secure with thread along the shank. This ensures the tips remain apart.



4 Remove any excess hackle stem, then run the tying thread down the shank. Take a few fibers of brown and grizzle hackle and catch them in place.



5 Offer a pinch of gray muskrat or rabbit underfur up to the thread. Dub it on to form a slim rope and wind up to the base of the wings to form the body.



6 Take two cock hackles, one brown, one grizzle, with fibers of equal length. Prepare them, leaving a short length of bare stem, and catch in behind the wing. Wind on four turns up to the eye. Secure with thread and remove the excess.
